GLOBAL PUBLIC POLICY 2024-2025 Course Information and Concentration Information (Updated 6/7/2024)

Background: As described on the Humphrey website, concentrations "provide an integrated portfolio of professional preparation." Our Master of Public Policy (MPP) program has a structured Global Policy concentration, *but we urge students in all of our degree programs* to take advantage of our global course offerings (some of which are listed below).

This paper outlines the MPP Global Public Policy concentration options and requirements and lists globally focused courses. The GPP concentration equips students with the essential knowledge, skills, and perspectives they need to launch careers as global professionals. Students gain a solid foundation of knowledge and relevant skills in areas that include **U.S. foreign and global security policy, international development policy, and human rights and humanitarianism.** Students interested in the Global Public Policy concentration should schedule meetings with their faculty advisors or with the Global Policy Chair, Eric Schwartz, to discuss their academic and career goals.

Requirements for the concentration:

<u>Three Global Policy Courses</u>: GPP MPP concentration students must take a minimum of nine credits in Global Policy Area courses. Beyond that basic requirement, there are other general MPP requirements, which we strongly recommend students tailor toward their global interests, as described directly below.

<u>Recommended global economics focus</u>: Students may follow any approved pathway to fulfill MPP *methods* requirements. In terms of those general MPP requirements, we strongly recommend that students take one of the following MPP core course options as their *second economics* course.

- 1. PA 5503 Economics of Development (Ibrahim) (3 cr, offered Fall)*
- 2. PA 5521 Development Planning and Policy Analysis. (Wahby) (4 cr, offered Spring)*
- 3. PA 5805 Global Economics (McDonald) (3 cr, offered Spring)*

*MPP Global Policy concentration students may use PA 5503, PA 5521, or PA 5805 to meet their second economics requirement *or* to meet their concentration requirement, but courses may not be double-counted to fulfill both.

Final Humphrey project

Students seeking a Global Public Policy concentration must complete either –

- A capstone (preferably one of the capstones offered in U.S. foreign and global security policy, international development policy, and human rights and humanitarianism); or
 - A final professional paper.

Students may want to consider the graduate minors in <u>Human Rights</u>, in <u>Science, Technology and Environmental Policy (STEP)</u>, or in Law.

<u>Courses that meet concentration requirements (and which may be of interest to students in any of our degree programs)</u>

There are some 30 courses below, each with information on the next semester it will be offered. The majority of the courses listed below will be offered during the 2024-2025 school year.

The University of Minnesota offers hundreds of other courses that focus in some way on global issues. Thus, alternate courses—that is, courses not listed here but which have significant global content—may meet concentration requirements, but must first be approved by the Global Policy Area chair. Some courses listed are not offered every year and new courses are frequently added, often under the "topics" group of PA 5890, and sometimes at relatively short notice. We will seek to keep students informed of such changes.
